

TWELFTH NIGHT: ACT 1 YEAR 5 AND YEAR 6 PUNCTUATION EXERCISE: COMMAS

L.I: TO USE COMMAS TO CLARIFY MEANING OR AVOID AMBIGUITY

Commas are used to

- separate items in a list
- separate direct speech from a reporting clause
- indicate parenthesis within a sentence with an embedded clause
- avoid ambiguity
- separate main and subordinate clauses.

The main focus for this activity is using commas to clarify meaning or avoid ambiguity. If you use a comma it can change the meaning of a sentence entirely. For example

Valentine Orsino's servant swept into the room

Valentine, Orsino's servant, swept into the room

By putting commas after *Valentine* and *servant*, the meaning of the sentence changes completely.
