

Macbeth: Act 4 Year 5 and Year 6 Punctuation Exercise: Possessive Apostrophes

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A possessive apostrophe is used to show that one thing belongs to or is connected to something.

Read the examples below:

1. A great banquet was to be held that very evening at Macbeth's Castle

Macbeth is a singular noun so you need to add an apostrophe and "s" to show that the castle belongs to Macbeth.

2. The warriors' swords were pulled out, ready to fight.

Warriors is a plural noun that ends in an "s" so you don't add another "s" after your apostrophe. You can just add an apostrophe to show the **swords** belonged to the warriors.

3. People's tongues were wagging.

People is a plural noun but it doesn't end with an "s" so you need to add an apostrophe and "s" to show that the **tongues** belonged to the **people**.

4. Ross' mouth couldn't utter the words.

Ross is a singular noun that ends in an "s", so you need to add an apostrophe to show that the **mouth** belongs to **Ross**.
